Dear Friends,

I hated sewing in 'HomeEc" class. We had the big old industrial machines which were difficult to thread and were just clunky. So, I just did what I had to do to get the "A" and move on. Fast forward to the next decade and I saw a beautiful hand applique block that a friend made and I got the bug, fever, burning desire or, whatever you want to call it. And I was off and running.

My first pieced quilt was the log cabin block and primarily blue. I was so proud of that quilt! The quilt is no longer in existence – we loved it, used it, washed it, played on it, and basically in the end it finally fell apart. I might have one block left that I use for teaching to show the use of batting and the quality of fabric.

So, at this point I know nothing about color or quality of fabric. I join a quilt guild. Oh my goodness, the quilts these ladies brought for show and tell were exquisite. I felt like I would never get to a point where I could stand up and show something I made. By this point, I thought I was good enough that I didn't need classes, nor did I want to spend the money on classes, because I could use it for fabric and books. Then one day a quilting friend suggested that taking a class will only increase my knowledge, friendships and in the end my quilting.

A few years later I decided to go to California and take Eleanor Burns teacher training. It was a gift of a lifetime. Eight hours or more a day with 14 other women soaking up all the knowledge we could. Eleanor is an amazing businesswoman! I came home, wrote a script and started teaching. BUT I still take classes to learn new techniques and love the comradery with other quilters.

I asked a new guild member recently if she was going to hang a quilt in the November show and she said 'Oh, my work isn't good enough'. We all start somewhere and the encouragement from others is what keeps us going. I hope she remembers this conversation and will gather up the courage to show her work. We are all here to support each other. Reach out to someone sitting alone at a meeting, looks new or a bit intimidated and uncomfortable. This person could be your best friend by the end of the year!



Anatomy of a Sewing Machine Needle

The sewing machine needle has an anatomy that many of us have never examined. We take for granted that as long as the needle is properly inserted in our machines, they will do their jobs well. Learning more about the design and engineering that goes into this vital tool can assist us in selecting the perfect needle size and style for a specific job



Here are the basic components of the domestic sewing machine needle:

Shank—The portion that is inserted into the machine and clamped into place, usually with the flat side toward the back of the machine.

Shoulder—The area that transitions from the shank to the shaft.

Shaft—A length of needle sufficient to carry the thread down through the material to the bobbin.

Groove—The cupped area along the length of the shaft that allows thread to be safely carried through the fabrics.

Scarf—The cutaway portion that allows extra room for the needle to pass very close to the shuttle or hook

Byecharischole through which the thread is placed in order to be carried through the material during stitching.

Point—The tip of the needle that allows the needle to safely pass through the weave or knit without making a tearing or cutting fibers.

The basic anatomy is similar across the needle family. Stark differences are more noticeable when you look more closely at the shape of the tip and size of the eye. **Universal**—The most common type of machine needle made for the domestic machine. It has a sharp tip and comes in a variety of widths for fine, medium, and heavy weight fabrics.

Ball Point—This needle was created when sewing with knits became popular. The tip can easily slide between fibers and not cut or damage the fabric.

Stretch—These are made for use on fabrics with lots of stretch/Spandex or similar fabrics. The rounded tip, special scarf, and eye prevent skipped stitches.

Jeans/Denim—Intended for use on tightly woven fabrics with a strong sharp tip and rounded eye.

Microtex/Sharp—Designed to be more slender and sharper than the universal needle. Ideal for quilting and appliqué.

Leather—This needle has an identifiably larger tip for piercing leather and vinyl, providing an opening large enough to cleanly carry the thread through the heavy material.

Self-Threading—This particular style can be used when the ability to thread a needle is compromised.

Focusing on the intended purpose of a sewing machine needle can assist you in selecting the proper tool for the job. Having the right needle for your project or material can lead to a much more enjoyable quilting experience.

Recipe Corner

STRAWBERRY SPINACH PASTA SALAD w/ORANGE POPPY SEED DRESSING

INGREDIENTS

8 ounces Penne Noodles cooked according to package directions

2 cups packed fresh baby spinach leaves

1 cup sliced strawberries

1 cup pineapple chunks

½ cup dried cranberries, or dried blueberries

½ cup salted cashews, or other nuts like pecans or walnuts

ORANGE POPPY SEED DRESSING

½ cup extra virgin olive oil

1/3 cup apple cider vinegar

1/4 cup plain Greek yogurt

1 tablespoon Dijon mustard

3 tablespoons honey

1/3 cup orange juice

2 teaspoons poppy seeds

Optional: pinch of salt and pepper
