- ❖ 2019 November 1 & 2 Quilt Show

Barb has sent an e-mail out to other Guilds in the area and attached our flyer and info page for them to share with their groups. We are also listed on the calendar page of the Florida Quilt Network. We have purchased an 8 x 10 full page ad on the inside back cover of the Program to be handed out at Stitcher Paradise, July 18 − 20, 2019 at the Hilton Carillon, St. Petersburg. In September we will be placing our ad in the Country Register as well. I will be distributing a flyer and an info page to as many quilt shops in the area as I can.

The Opportunity Quilt is finished, quilted, bound and labeled. 

Monthly Quilt Show Boutique Project

Louise Isabelle has asked that instead of waiting until September, 2019 to finish your fat quarter cutting, could you please work ahead and do 3 or 4 at a time. If we wait until September, 2019 to complete, we will not have enough time to make up the final packets for the Boutique.

Trim your Fat Quarters carefully. Remove the selvedge. Then cut each Fat Quarter as described below.

- ☐ The first cut will be 10" this will then be cut into two 10" squares
- Next cut a 5" strip. Then subcut into four 5" squaresFinally, cut a 2 ½" strip



Pass your Charms, Layer Cakes and 2 ½" strips to either Louise Isabelle, or Terri Coley at the Guild Meeting. Put them in a plastic bag each month and put your name on the bag.

Cut two Fat Quarters of each color (See Sample Diagram)

Two 10" Squares Four 5" Charms One 2 1/2" Strip


2020 Hernando Guild Challenge

The Roaring 20's

The 2019 Guild Challenge winners of "Best of Show" and "Viewer's Choice", Pam Russavage and Terry Coley, have chosen "The Roaring 20's" as the theme for the 2020 Challenge in honor of moving into the next decade of the 21st Century.

The 1920's were nicknamed "The Roaring 20's" due to the exuberance, drama and boisterousness of the decade. You could incorporate these elements into your quilt with color, fabric and embellishments. Historically, the 1920's are known for women's suffrage, Hollywood's golden era, popularization of the automobile, prohibition and speakeasies, jazz, the new woman (flappers), Frank Lloyd Wright, Art Deco, Modern Abstract art and the stock market crash, to name a few. You may want to base your quilt on one of these subjects. You may want to play off the theme title; using animal prints or 20 different fabrics, or even 20-20 vision. You can use a purchased quilt pattern, or design one of your own, create a mini quilt, wall hanging or pillow.

Let your imagination roar in celebration of a new decade



Categories: Entries will be judged in one category.

Judging: We will again try to bring in an outside judge and will have "Best of Show", 1st place, 2nd place,

and 3rd place. Guild members will vote for the winner of "Viewer's Choice".

Quilting: You must have hand or machine quilting on your entry.

Size: No smaller than 16X16 and no larger than 45x60. If your entry is smaller or larger than the

specifications, your entry will not be judged.

Due Date: February 27, 2020 – Guild Meeting

Rules: You are not allowed to use a project that has been made previous to this challenge. It must be

made between March 28, 2019 and February 27, 2020. There will be a sign-up sheet when you

turn in your entry and you must have your name on the back of the entry.

Fabric Design Changes in the 18th & 19th Centuries

Changing Times

At the beginning of the 1800's, most American quilts were made in the English tradition of wholecloth quilts or mosaic patchwork, a technique of sewing on paper templates, which we now refer to as English paper piecing. During this period, most fabrics were imported, as well, and were quite expensive for the average homemaker. Quilts, therefore, were

By the 1820's, the American Industrial Revolution was well underway. Textile mills engaged in weaving and printing fabrics, quickly popped up along the rivers of New England, making fabric affordable for the average household. Ouilting designs

associated with the upper class.



were undergoing changes, as well. In a departure from the English style of quilting, pieced blocks were becoming popular, with patches no longer sewn onto paper templates. Block patterns would develop into a typically American quilting style.

The fabric samples here circa 1830 prints shows early 19th century designs that were used in old English paper-piecing method or the "new" American block-piecing style.

New Nation

This collection, featuring a delicately engraved focal print, are accurate reproductions of 1830 to 1870 designs. Designer, Nancy Gere tells us the following about this beautiful fabric line.

"During these years, textile printers from the Alsace region of France were producing, what many considered the best in calico printing, and the American mills were eager to keep up with their European



Counterparts. The excellence and authenticity of the New Nation collection is just a small sampling of the type of designs that were produced during this time."

We applaud the original designers of these wonderful prints, and thank Nancy Gere for reproducing the patterns for 21^{st} – century quiltmakers.



Perfectly Paisley

During the late 18th century, the East India Company brought back beautiful shawls from Kashmir bearing a unique teardrop-shaped design. The design, based on a stylized plan form, became known as paisley, from Paisley, Scotland, where the mills in early 19th century first wove affordable copies of the shawls.

The paisley motif has been interpreted in a myriad of ways over the years and still retains its popularity today. The Paisley fabric samples to the right are some depicting early 19th century designs and are still available today.




Florrie's Favorites

This collection, designed by Froncie Quinn, were inspired by the 18th and 19th century prints found in quilts made by Florence Peto.

In the 1950's, Florence Peto (1884-1970) was instrumental in collecting and documenting Vermont's Shelburne Museum quilt collection, now one of the largest and most diverse collections in the country. She was also responsible for



Placing and documenting quilts in other museums, as well. It was Florence who placed the fabulous Mary Totten "Rising Sun" quilt in the Smithsonian. Florence was an accomplished quiltmaker, author, historian and antique-textile collector. This inductee into the Quilter's Hall of Fame helped lay the foundation for the quilt revival of the late $20^{\rm th}$ century.







THIS & THAT....



Practical Tips for a Sewing Room Clutter Cleanse

Kick clutter to the curb in minutes a day! This no-fail plan shows you how to confront quilting room mess—and keep it clean.

Ask yourself:

Am I surrounded by only working, functional items? When you sit or stand at your desk, every item within reach must work. Test every tool, supply, and machine. Toss (never donate) dull scissors or broken tools. Furthermore, a desk isn't about display; narrow down to one or two personal items and move the rest of your tchotchkes to shelves or display ledges.

Do I need more than one? Sewing supplies are sometimes sold in multiples or include refills. Multiples can go into a drawer or cabinet elsewhere in the room -- you don't need them clogging up your work space.

What's my go-to choice? Embrace your preference for rulers, cutting and marking tools, and other supplies—and stock only these in your work zone. Let go of all the nice-enough-but-not-for-you options now.

What do I actually use? Keep only items you use frequently on your work space. Place items you use less regularly nearby shelves, drawers, or cabinets.

Short-term or long-term? The quickest way to cut through piled papers is to sort short-term (patterns you're working on, articles you're reading) and long-term (machine instructions). Organize short-term papers with vertical solutions (a bulletin board above your desk, wall pockets) and long-term papers with horizontal solutions (sorting trays, a file box, or a file cabinet with hanging folders).

Schedule your cleanse. You make better decisions when you work uninterrupted, so block out 15- to 45-minute appointments on your schedule.

Aim for consistency. Schedule your cleanse session for the same time for a few consecutive days, perhaps every morning before your family wakes or immediately after dinner.

Minimize disruptions. Let your family know ahead of time when you'll be busy. A consistent daily decluttering time helps.

Be prepared: Dress in comfy clothes. Put on some music. Have a favorite beverage or snack close by.

Gather your supplies. You'll need the following items close at hand for each cleanse session: Permanent markers and index cards or heavy stock paper to make labels for piles as you sort or boxes headed to donation centers Boxes and bags to hold sorted items Scissors or utility knife

Touch once, decide once. Decluttering involves deciding to keep or let go, so the main activity throughout the cleanse is picking up or touching an item and asking, "Should I keep this?" If you instantly know something needs to stay or go (and you have space to store it), go with your gut. No need to analyze. However, if you're not quite sure, see "Four Tough Questions," *below*, to help you reach your decision.

Work like a machine. Go through any space you're decluttering in a methodical fashion—left to right, high to low, front to back—whatever makes sense for your project. Don't jump around the space. Don't try to be creative or clever.

Keep moving. When you don't quickly know whether to keep or get rid of an item, place it in a pile and keep moving through the room. Save the last 5 to 10 minutes of the session to deal with your pile of questionable items.

Know what's next. Don't fret about what to do with stuff you're not keeping. You have only four options: Sell it, give it away, donate it, or recycle/dispose of it. Label four boxes accordingly and keep moving.

Keep testing simple. Operate tools and machines to see whether they work. Verify that you have all the pieces of kits. Then move immediately to deciding whether the item is a keeper.

Skip touching when it bogs you down. If you're decluttering items with emotional connections, have a neutral person hold up the item and ask whether you want to keep it. Without a physical connection to the item, you'll be in a better state of mind to make quick, clear-headed decisions.

Four Tough Questions

Do I love it? Keep anything you truly love. You'll always remember (and probably regret) giving away something you love. But be aware that keeping a beloved item may mean you must get rid of something else in order to make room.

Do I use it? And if so, how often? Keep anything you use—and start storing the stuff you use more frequently in the easiest places to access.

Do I have more than one? If so, edit down to the best one. Of course, having more than one rotary cutter may make sense, but having two of the same triangle template is tough to justify.

Can I get another? If you suddenly need the item or it miraculously comes back into style, remind yourself that you can usually buy or borrow another one.

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


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
