Fabric Hoarders Beware!

A recent study has indicated that fabric gives off certain Pheromones, that actually hypnotize women and cause them to purchase ungodly amounts.

QUILTING HISTORY



Martha Washington's Needlework Remembered

The "Mother Of Our Country" Sets The Pace

Martha Dandridge Custis Washington, first lady from 1789 to 1797, was a skilled needle-woman. The pieced counterpane pictured here is attributed to her. The word counterpane is an eighteenth century term for different types of textiles used as bed

coverings, such as a woven coverlet, woolen blanket, or single layer of cloth with fringed edges. Martha's counterpanes can be loosely compared to less elaborate cotton bedcovers called "coverlets" in the northeast and "summer spreads" in other parts of the United States. The "Penn Treaty Counterpane" made by Martha Washington (circa 1785) features a medallion-style quilt layout. The name of this piece is derived from the center copperplate print fabric, which depicts an October 1682 scene in which William Penn (1644-1718) is said to have signed a 'Great Treaty' with North American Indians for the purpose of land acquisition.

No copy of this treaty exists today. Some historians have concluded that the treaty never existed at all, or that perhaps it was destroyed so that its terms would not have to be observed. However, at the time that Martha made her counterpane, the print panel depicting this historic event (which reportedly happened more than one hundred years before) had just become available. Another example of this special Penn Treaty fabric uses blue threads and is presently located in the textile collection of the Winterthur Museum in Delaware, according to Printed Textiles: English and American Cottons and Linens, 1700-1850 by Florence M. Montgomery (Viking Press, 1970). She states that bed hangings using this same fabric were sold in Pennsylvania in 1788.

Martha Washington Remembered


Martha's reputation is one of a kindly woman and an icon of colonial life. At age 17, she married Daniel Parke Custis, a wealthy landowner. They had four children, two of whom died in infancy.

At age 25, she found herself a widow with two small children. She met George Washington at a cotillion ball and they later married. George proved to be a kindly stepfather to her two surviving children, Patsy and Jack. But fate was unkind to George and Martha; they lost both children when they were ages 17 and 26, respectively. After that, the first lady comforted herself by caring for two of her grandchildren, whom she and George raised at Mount Vernon.

Quilted Tributes

In light of Martha's fine needlework skills, it seems appropriate that a number of quilt blocks were named in her honor. Many of these (as well as blocks named after other first ladies) were created during the Colonial Revival Era of the 1920s and 1930s. They stem from a deep-rooted fascination with all things colonial at a time when our nation was looking reverently and

nostalgically to the past. An applique block, "Martha Washington Wreath," utilizes red and pink for layers of the flower petals, a yellow circle for the flower center. The color palette is completed with green leaves, and all motifs are appliqued onto a white background. This pattern was recorded in The Romance of the Patchwork Quilt in America by Carrie Hall and Rose Kretsinger (Caxton Printers, 1935). Not surprisingly, a similar block with slightly different leaf shapes is called "President's Wreath." Yet another block, alternately



called "Martha Washington Star," "Martha Washington Design," or simply "Martha Washington," was published in Farmer's Wife in 1926.



Tips / Tricks / Recipes



THE PERFECT QUARTER INCH

Cut your fabric pieces as accurately as possible. Sometimes simply the width of a marking pencil is enough to cause inaccuracy. When using acrylic tools include the line in measuring. For example if you are cutting a two inch strip -- the previous cut edge of the fabric should include the two inch line on the ruler in your strip. If you need to use a presser foot you already have and it isn't quite accurate here are some things you might try.

Machine setting — If your machine has settings for different needle positions, simply set your needle to the left or right so your stitching line is exactly a scant 1/4" from the edge of the presser foot. Program this into your machine memory so you can touch a button every time you turn on your machine. If your machine doesn't have a memory, write your special piecing setting on an index card or sticky note and keep it near your machine.

Make a raised area to guide the fabric -- Place the quarter inch line of a small ruler under the presser foot with 1/4" showing at the right of the needle. Turn the hand wheel on the machine until the needle touches the 1/4" mark on the ruler. Move the ruler back and forth as necessary until the 1/4" mark is exactly below the point of the needle. Cut a piece of masking tape about two inches long and place it on the bed of the sewing machine butted up to the right of the ruler. Place additional layers of tape to build up a thickness so you have a raised area to guide the fabric accurately. The same could be done with a stack of sticky notes.

An alternate to masking tape and sticky notes would be mole foam -- a foot care product available in the pharmacy. Cut a piece about 1/4" wide and two inches long. Peel the protective paper and stick the mole foam on the machine bed next to the ruler.

Careful pressing is also important to accurate piecing. If the pieces are not pressed carefully some inaccuracy can occur. A lot of patterns call for a scant quarter inch simply because a tiny amount of the seam allowance is taken up in the fold.

A quarter inch seam allowance is very important to the success of your quilt piecing. So a little time spent getting a correct seam allowance will be well worth it in the long run.

Recipe Corner

RANCH CHICKEN

These breaded chicken breasts are crispy and brown on the outside and tender and juicy on the inside. The seasoned crumbs add extra flavor.



4 boneless skinless chicken breast halves (I Lb.)

1/4 cup ranch dressing

1/3 cup Progresso dry bread crumbs (any flavor)

- 2 tablespoons olive or vegetable oil
- 1. Dip chicken into dressing, then coat with bread crumbs.
- In 10-inch skillet, heat oil over medium-high heat. Cook chicken in oil 12 to 15 minutes, turning once, until outside is golden brown and juice is no longer pink when centers of thickest pieces are cut.

Chipotle-Lime Dressing

- 1 cup ranch dressing
- 1 Tbs. lime juice
- 1 Tbs. finely chopped chipotle chilies in adobo sauce (from 7-oz can)
- 1 tsp. grated lime peel

Wraps

- 3 cups chopped cold deli rotisserie chicken (from 2 to 2 ½ Lb. chicken
- 2 cups thinly sliced iceberg lettuce
- 1 cup frozen corn, cooked, cooled
- 1 small tomato, seeded, chopped (1/3 cup)
- 1 cup shredded Monterey Jack cheese (4 oz.)
- 1 Pkg. (11 oz.) flour tortillas for burritos (8 tortillas; 8 inch) Thick and Chunky Salsa, if desired.
- Sour Cream, if desired.
- 1. In small bowl, mix dressing ingredients; set aside. In large bowl, stir together chicken, lettuce, corn and tomato. Add dressing; toss to coat.
- 2. To assemble each wrap, spoon 1/8 of chicken mixture down center of each tortilla; sprinkle w/cheese. Roll up. Serve immediately with salsa and sour cream.
