 - ✓ Silent Auction Items (small wall-hangings, wearable art, etc.) These are items you will make and willing to give up for auction to make money for the guild.

 - ✓ Raffle Baskets bring in new items, or very gently used items you might have received that you don't use, i.e. rulers, cutters, patterns, books, etc. to donate to the raffle basket.






QUILTING HISTORY



History of Quilting in America

The Patchwork Quilt

Of all the things a woman's hands have made, The quilt so lightly thrown across her bed – The quilt that keeps her loved ones warm – Is woven of her love and dreams and thread.

What is a Quilt?

Ask nearly any Appalachian woman what a quilt is and she would answer with amusement, "Why, everyone knows what a quilt is! It's a big piece of cloth, made out of lot of little pieces, sewed to another plain piece of cloth, with batting in between." True, but the purpose of this study topic is to go beyond this simple definition of a quilt as a "textile sandwich" to a broader understanding of what it may have meant to the maker, as well as the history of quilting itself.

History of Quilting

Quilting did not originate in America, although it certainly took on a new form in this country. The earliest known quilted item is a garment found on the statue of an Egyptian pharaoh who lived about 3400 BC. Quilted garments were worn for protection under the armor of the crusading knights in the Middle Ages. They were all made of whole pieces of cloth as were the "bed rugs" made in Europe by men in the tailor guilds. Although patchwork was developed much later, the appliqué technique was widely used to make the ornamental unquilted hangings for the churches of the Middle Ages. Appliqué also decorated the robes of the royal elite.

Quilting in America

Quilted garments and bedcovers were very important to America's early settlers, although it is not known exactly when they were introduced. Most guilt scholars agree, however, that the use and development of quilting came from English and Dutch immigrants. There is no evidence that the Spanish or French colonists made use of the technique. The Spanish settlers in the warm climate in the southern areas of the country had little use for the warmth provided by quilted items, and the French in Canada sought protection from the cold with furs, which were easily obtained. The English and the Dutch who settled along the upper half of the eastern coast are given credit for developing the arts of patchwork and quilting. They applied their skills in spinning and weaving to make quilted garments to protect them during the colder months and used the leftover scraps, together with the best parts of worn out garments, to fashion quilted patchwork bedcovers. Beth Gutcheon has written that America has only a few indigenous art forms - jazz, the blues, and the patchwork quilt and the guilt is the blues song of the American

During the Depression years of the 1930s, the frugality that had been handed down through the generations was again popular. Homemakers saved the buttons from worn-out dresses and used the least-faded pieces from under the collars and inside the pockets for quilt patches, the larger pieces of the skirts for aprons, the smaller pieces for dust rags, and the leftover strips to tie up tomatoes in the garden. Along with their ingenuity in using what they had, they were also satisfying their need for self-expression and beauty in their harsh lives. The wealthier settlers during the late 1700s and early 1800s were able to import beautiful fabric to have clothing made for the wives and daughters. The leftover scraps were used to appliqué quilts, a technique that is naturally wasteful and time-consuming, but these women, who had servants, had the time and leisure and did not need to worry about costs.




Tips / Tricks / Recipes

THREAD TUG OF WAR / HOW TENSION WORKS

Sewing machines are factory preset to have the top and bottom thread form even stitches when sewing with a 50 or 60 wt. thread. If the top and bottom threads are identical in fiber and weight, adjustments may not be necessary. However, if we use cotton on top and poly underneath, or metallic on top and poly underneath, or a heavy thread on top and a fine thread underneath, it is necessary to adjust the tension settings. It is perfectly OK to use different thread types and weights on the top and bottom. Relying on a machine's automatic tension system is not always enough.

Think of the top and bottom thread as having a tug of war. If the threads are identical and you are sewing on a single layer of fabric, both sides have equal strength and the result will be a draw. The sewing should therefore produce perfectly even stitches with no top thread showing underneath and no bobbin thread showing on top. However, in the real world, the teams are rarely equal. One team will be stronger or bigger or faster than the other. We sometimes use decorative or sensitive threads on top. We often use different fibers for the top and bottom threads. We also add stabilizer or batting. Sometimes we might use a cotton bobbin thread and other times we use a polyester bobbin thread. All these factors make it necessary to adjust the tension for each project. By adjusting the top tension either up or down, we are able to add or take away strength on the top thread team to equalize the tug of war battle. Following is a list of things that affect stitch results:

- **1. Batting.** This adds drag on top thread. Cotton batting tends to grab the thread more than poly batting, adding more friction on the thread.
- 2. <u>Fabric type</u>. Dense fabric puts more stress on the thread.
- **3.** Top thread thickness and type. Metallic is less flexible than cotton or poly. Poly is usually stronger than cotton or rayon.
- **4. Bobbin thread type.** Cotton bobbin thread tends to grab more than a smooth filament polyester. Sometimes grabbing is preferred and sometimes it causes problems. A smooth filament poly thread (not spun poly) in the bobbin will work better with metallic and other sensitive threads because its smooth finish acts almost like a lubricant, sliding nicely with the thread.



Recipe Corner



- 1 can (16 oz.) Old El Paso® traditional refried beans
- 1 container (8 oz.) sour cream
- 1 package (0.4 oz.) ranch dressing mix (buttermilk recipe)
- 2 small tomatoes, seeded, finely chopped
- 1/2 cup sliced ripe olives, black, green or both drained
- 6 medium green onions, sliced (6 tablespoons)
- 1/2 medium red bell pepper, chopped
- 1 cup shredded Cheddar cheese (4 oz.)
- 16 oz. tortilla chips



- On flat 10- to 12-inch plate, spread refried beans. In small bowl, mix sour cream and dressing mix; spread over beans.
- 2. Top with tomatoes, olives, onions and bell pepper; sprinkle with cheese. Serve with tortilla chips.

Makes 16 servings (1/4 cup dip and 1 oz. chips each)

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


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
