## GUILD NEWS AND NOTES

* 2013 QUILT SHOW - The Quilt Show for 2013 will be held on November 1st and $2^{\text {nd }}, 2013$. It will be held as a two day show at an indoor venue this time at the Brooksville Enrichment Center (the Old Quarry Building) off Route 41. Plans are moving right along and there will be more to follow as we get closer to show time. Handouts/Flyers were prepared by Barb Theriault and they will be distributed to Quilt Shops and Quilt Guilds very soon. Also, information on the quilt show is presently on our website.
* QUILT SHOW ENTRY FORMS - Quilt Show Entry Forms and rules were e-mailed out by Karen Pilon last month. Extra copies were printed and are available at the meetings for those who do not have e-mail. Please read the rules carefully and fill out your forms as soon as possible and attach a picture of your quilt to each form. Don't forget to give a description of your quilt, pattern reference, etc. of 30 words or less so Karen can type this info and attach to your quilt for the show. Please e-mail or send your form to Karen as soon as your quilt is ready, even if you do not submit the actual quilt right away so she can start typing the info and record the sizes of the quilts for placement in the show. All entries should be in no later than the September meeting so proper placement for the show can be done. Put each quilt in a pillowcase with your name on it and give to Sharon Allard, Nancy Jenkins or Karen Pilon. Don't forget to put a label on your quilt with your name as well.
* QUILT SHOW HANGERS NEEDED - Please go to your local stores and search your closets to accumulate pant/skirt hangers w/clips and a hook that turns. We will need these for hanging quilts at our show. Please turn them in to Karen Pilon or Nancy Jenkins.
* 2013 QUILT SHOW OPPORTUNITY QUILT - The ticket sales for the 2013 Opportunity Quilt are moving right along. Tickets were sold at the Expo in Lakeland in March, at Nana's Quilt Shop in April and also Scrap \& Sew in early May. Thank you to all the volunteers who sold tickets at the various venues.
* THINGS YOU SHOULD BE DOING IN PREPARATION FOR THE QUILT SHOW OVER THE SUMMER - Next November will be here before you know it. In preparation for the various displays at the show we will need you to be working on the following things:
$\checkmark$ Silent Auction Items (small wall-hangings, wearable art, etc.) These are items you will make and willing to give up for auction to make money for the guild.
$\checkmark$ Boutique Table - Start making items for our wonderful Boutique Table and give to Ellie and her girls.
$\checkmark$ Raffle Baskets - bring in new items, or very gently used items you might have received that you don't use, i.e. rulers, cutters, patterns, books, etc. to donate to the raffle basket.
$\checkmark$ Quilts For Show (Please finish the quilts you would like to put in the show. Some important things you need to do:
- Always a good idea to put a Label on your quilt identifying quilt name, date and maker.
- Stock up on pillow cases to put your quilts in and fill out an entry form w/picture for each quilt to submit for show (try garage sales for old pillow cases)
* BULLETIN BOARDS - Bulletin Boards have now been on display at our monthly meetings to share classes, Thank you letters, new ideas, etc. Please make a point of viewing them at each meeting. You will be sure to find something of interest to you.
* QUILTING TECHNIQUES/ CLASSES - Classes and Special Groups are still being held at the Brooksville Enrichment Center. You must join the Brooksville Enrichment Center for a yearly fee of $\$ 15.00$ allowing you access to our classes as well as anything else offered by the Enrichment Center. Here is a little helpful hint if you have a $1 / 2$ yard of some fabric you don't really want, but it fits the particular theme for the monthly fat quarter drawings. Just follow these instructions to turn your $1 / 2$ yard into two fat quarters.

## How to Make Fat Quarters from Yardage

To convert a half yard into two fat quarters, simply fold the fabric in half and match the selvage edges. Make a crease along the fold of the fabric. Open up the fabric and cut on the fold with a rotary cutter or scissors. You now have two pieces of fabric that measure approximately $18^{\prime \prime} \times 21^{\prime \prime}$.

## Remembering Shirley Williams

We are all saddened by the death of our dear friend and fellow quilter, Shirley Williams, who lost her battle with Cancer on May 10 ${ }^{\text {th }}$, 2013. She was surrounded by the love of her family.

Shirley was born in Belleview, Florida and moved to Long Island for a few years, then on to
Massachusetts. She met her husband in Church after he had flown his own plane home from California. They had 55-1/2 years together before he passed away. They raised one daughter and two sons who now live in Wyoming, Missouri, and Montana respectively. She and her husband moved to Spring Hill in 1977 and she said she was amazed how things had changed over the years.
Shirley taught herself to sew at an early age on a Singer Treadle Sewing Machine. After periods of macramé, ceramics, crewel embroidery and counted cross stitch, she joined the Hernando Quilters' Guild in 1992. It was in that relationship her quilting journey began.

She held several offices and was President from 1999 to 2001. Through the years Shirley had made numerous quilts for her children and her 5 grand children, taking pride in every one.
When arrangements were being made for a family reunion, she silk embroidered all the T -shirts for the reunion.

Shirley was a very active member of the Guild and also entered several quilts in the Hernando County Fair winning Blue Ribbons as well as Green Ribbons, for Best of Class and Best of Category. She always said that the Fair was a very nice event in Hernando County and would encourage all quilters to enter their prize quilts.

She was also a very active and dedicated member of her Church in Spring Hill and was kind enough to donate 3 wall-hangings to the Church. One of which was 12 squares of Bible Stories, a very appropriate gift.

We were very fortunate to have known Shirley and she will be sadly missed by all her quilting friends. Her quilts will remain her legacy for her family to enjoy for years to come.

Following the tradition of the Guild, a book will be donated by the Guild to the Spring Hill Library in memory of Shirley.

## Quilting As a Means of Self-expression

Quilt patterns have been named to express political feelings, such as the "Whig Rose," "Tippecanoe and Tyler Too," and "Clay's Choice." Others, such as "Burgoyne Surrounded," commemorate historical events.


Every day living provided many of the names of these old quilts, such as "Log Cabin," "Flying Geese," "Maple Leaf," "Broken Dishes," and "Indian Hatchet." Some quilt names came from their makers' abiding faith: "Jacob's Ladder," "Job's Tears," and "Star of Bethlehem."

Quilt-making also helped the makers assuage their sorrows, with the ultimate example of this being the "Kentucky Coffin" quilt described in Quilts in America. Made in 1839, in shades of brown, it has a fenced-in cemetery in its center that contains coffins with the names of dead family members inscribed on them. (Pictured above). Along the border are coffins appliqued with other family members' names, waiting until they die to be moved into the center. Modern quilters also use quilting as an outlet for their troubles, as in the well known "Divorce Quilt," with the woman who broke up the maker's marriage being portrayed as a cat.

Despite these quilts to relieve sorrows, probably more of the quilts made over the years have been intended to celebrate happier times, such as births, wedding, and graduations.

As the development of the country spread westward, quilts were often given as a departure gift. One example of this is the quilt made by Ankey Hutchison of Monroe County, West Virginia for her step-grandson who was leaving for Nebraska.

A similar quilt, documented by the West Virginia Heritage Quilt Search in 1992, was made by Ankey for her niece in 1884. Both were covered with appliqued verses from a Church of the Brethren hymn. Check West Virginia Quilts and Quilt Makers (p.166) for a photo.

Another quilt that was made as an act of homage can also be seen in West Virginia Quilts and Quiltmakers (p.170). This quilt, with a separate block for each of the 48 states, was made by Ella Martin, a Coal miner's wife from Montcalm. It was a gift for President Franklin D. Roosevelt in 1933 expressing her appreciation for the National Recovery Act, which was designed to stimulate the economy and protect the workers. Her quilt was given to the West Virginia Cultural Center in Charleston by the person who purchased it from its last owner, Mrs. Roosevelt's mail clerk.


Quilting served a communal function as well, with groups of women getting together for quilting parties. The women worked on the quilt, children played, and the men, who may have spent their day in haymaking or other farm work, joined

## Tips / Tricks / Recipes

## CHOOSING FAT QUARTERS FOR A QUILT

## Start With a Favorite Color

When choosing individual fat quarters, start with your favorite color first, disregarding its value or scale. Find that chosen color on a color wheel and work clockwise until you have gathered at least one fabric in each color family that looks good next to your first choice. The quantity of coordinates is up to you.

## Create a Palette

Palettes are collections of fabrics that vary in scale and value and are arranged in various tints, shades, and tones of a pure color. Consider the brightest, clearest fabric your pure color. Adding white to a pure color will create a pastel tint; adding black creates a deep, warm shade; and adding gray creates a soft, subtle tone.

## Incorporate Yardage

Larger cuts can be included successfully without spoiling the effect of a scrappy quilt-especially in a border. By isolating one aspect of the quilt (such as the border), you can devote more time to selecting just the right fat quarters for the center of the quilt. Flexibility is the key!

## Duplicate Fat Quarters

It's okay to use more than one fat quarter of the same print. Just because individual quantities of fat quarters are listed doesn't mean you can't duplicate them.

## Choose A Range Of Values

Value is determined by the lightness or darkness of a fabric. A light fabric could be white, ivory, beige, or tan with (or without) any other color added to the print. A dark value is simply that-dark-and a medium value falls somewhere between the light and the dark. Values can vary depending on the lightness or darkness of the fabrics placed next to them. Expanding on your first choices and following the same color-wheel concept, choose coordinating fabrics that are lighter or darker than the original ones. Stack them in order from light to dark. Use a transparent value finder to see if your perception is correct. Value can also be tested by standing back at least 10 feet from the fabric and squinting. Squinting helps you see variations in value more easily.

## Vary Fabric Scale

Scale refers to the size of the print on a fabric. After testing the value, examine your selections to see how many of the prints vary in size. A mix of various scales in a quilt not only adds movement, but also keeps the eye interested. If your collection lacks variety of scale, rethink your choices.

## Recipe Corner

## RHUBARB BLUEBERRY CRISP

This yummy fruit crisp is a recipe Quilt Designer, Kim Diehl created to use fresh rhubarb out of her garden. Serve warm with a scoop of vanilla ice cream, or a dollop of whipped cream and enjoy a little bit of home-cooked goodness.

## For the Crust/Topping:

1 cup flour
1 cup packed brown sugar
$1 / 4$ cup quick cooking oats
$1 / 2$ cup ( 1 stick) butter, melted
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
Place all ingredients in a medium bowl and mix until crumbly

## For the Filling:

4 cups fresh rhubarb, sliced into $1 / 2$ " thick pieces
1 cup fresh blueberries, washed and dried, with stems removed.

1 cup water
1 cup sugar
2 tablespoons cornstarch
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
$1 / 4$ teaspoon almond extract
$1 / 4$ teaspoon salt
Enough butter to coat an 8" or 9" baking dish
Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Butter an 8" or 9" baking dish or pie plate. Press enough of the crust/topping mixture into the bottom of the dish to make a layer about $1 / 4$ " thick. Top with sliced rhubarb and sprinkle with blueberries.

Add water to a small saucepan. Stir together sugar and cornstarch, and whisk into the water. Add vanilla extract, almond extract and salt. Cook the mixture over medium heat, stirring constantly, until boiling. Remove from heat and pour over fruit. Sprinkle with the remaining crust/topping mixture. Bake uncovered 45 minutes, or until golden brown and bubbly around the edges.



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
