

You sent such GREAT supplies-- The ladies will really enjoy all the trims, ribbons, etc...and the coordinating purple fabrics--FABULOUS!!!

I am sending you a picture from my first visit to teach the ladies to sew. This young lady showed real promise with her sewing skills. She had a notebook that she had made in school showing a lot of sewing techniques. Someone had donated a large piece of white eyelet fabric with a scalloped border. When the girl saw it, that's what she wanted to make, a skirt. I told her that we would measure it so that the scallops would form the hemline. Then a blouse out of the same fabric to go with it. I told her we'd do the same so that the scallops would form its hemline. While we were working on the ensemble, I asked WHY she wanted a white outfit. I thought that perhaps she wanted something to wear for a wedding... No, she was getting baptized in a few weeks and she wanted an all white outfit for that. I almost cried. For the Haitians, baptism is a HUGE event. They save up their money and plan a big celebration. Their family members come in from many miles away for the event. I am so thankful that I was able to be a part of that celebration!!! You may understand now why I enjoy helping these ladies--I come home far more blessed than the blessings I take to them!! Be assured that those Haitian sewing sisters will know of their sewing sisters here in the U.S. who sacrificed time, money and supplies to help them to better their life here on this earth. # QUILTING HISTORY



# **History Of Red Work**



Red work is believed to have originated in Europe in the early 1800's and traveled to America around 1850 with the availability of color fast red floss. The availability of color fast red thread and inexpensive cotton fabric led to an abundance of interest in this type of embroidery. From the 1860's through the 1920's it became popular for young girls to be taught to embroider using red thread floss on cotton squares using simple patterns. These "penny squares"—the simple cotton and floss could be purchased for a penny in dry goods stores across the country—were quickly stitched and often put together block by block into lightweight bed covers.

The outline or running stitch is used primarily for the design with the occasional more fancy stitches of Crazy Quilting being added for embellishment.

Red work designs were used for home decorating during this time period. Vintage Red work pieces can be found across America today at antique stores and flea markets. The designs were usually used in dresser scarves, coverlets, towels, and other items for home decoration. This type of embroidery was applied to very functional pieces of linen or cotton that were meant to withstand daily use. It was not unusual for moral sayings expressing the virtues of hard work to be stitched in script with flowers added for a charming effect.

A resurgence in this simple embroidery began in the late 1990's and continues today. Red work groups have sprung up at quilt stores as women fall in love with the simplicity of the vintage designs and the easy use of the patterns.

#### Red work: A Home Business for Women

Manufacturers encouraged women to start a home business of stamping fabrics for friends and neighbors. Kits including all the necessary materials including a large variety of designs were sold for this purpose.

In the 1870s iron on transfers were developed. This was a welcome new product compared to the old stamping methods. How much easier it was to apply the design to the fabric with a warm iron.

#### Only Later Was Red work Used for Quilts

It wasn't until the turn of the century that women began to use red work embroidery for bedcoverings. Preprinted squares ready to embroider were sold. Because they originally cost only about a penny a piece, they were commonly called penny squares.

The quilt blocks used for red work quilts ranged from six to ten inches across. They were usually embroidered then sewn together without any sashing between the blocks. Often a feather or cross-stitch was used to cover the seam line. Later a red or red print sashing was sometimes used. Some of these bedcoverings were quilted while others were simply lined without batting and then tied at the corners of each block.

#### **Blossoming Out in a Rainbow of Colors**

In the 1920's more and more embroidered pieces were done with a delightful variety of colors as methods were found to make all colors colorfast. Barbara Brackman wrote, "Floral baskets and bouquets, nursery rhymes and new themes of state birds and state flowers are typical subject matter for these quilts." Today DMC and other companies offer several types of thread in a multitude of colors including new variegated threads.



# Tips / Tricks / Recipes



#### TIPS FROM QUILTERS AROUND THE WORLD

# **Organization**

- ❖ I keep a magnet close to me when sewing. It helps in picking up dropped pins. Even better it holds my needles when I'm doing hand work I thread several and stick them to the magnet. - Debra
- This might not be anything new but I was given a free standing cup holder. Instead of using it for cups, it is perfect for hanging all my scissors on. -Carla in Florida
- I like using lots of different fabrics when designing quilts. My current project has about 60 fabrics. I start with one to three fabrics or colors and build from there. To make shopping easier, I use an 8" X 10" post photo album into which I put a draft of my quilt, notes, and 2" or 3" swatches of fabrics I have chosen. I take this album with me when I visit quilt shops and use it as my reference guide. This way I can make sure that as I choose new fabrics, I stay "on theme or color course", properly vary my values and shades, and don't buy the same fabric twice by mistake. On one page might be my reds, marked with the amounts I bought of each and the store that I bought it from (in case I need to buy more). Other pages will hold other colors. When I finish the quilt, I add photos and put these "shopping" album pages into a larger, permanent album that is left at home for display and for history. It's my coffee table book. I am quilting a cover for it to make it even more special. Watch out at quilt shops - your shopping album will be a major hit that everyone wants to look at. I have met and made some wonderful new friends thanks to my album. - Kathy in Texas
- Last weekend I received a lovely bunch of flowers and around the daisy buds were these neat little net socks very much like the ones sold to put around the large spools of quilting thread. These are smaller and fit my spools of piecing cotton thread. And free, too. Nancy in North Carolina

# **Recipe Corner**

#### **SWEET POTATO SALAD**

- 2 Lbs. Sweet Potatoes
- 1 1/4 Cups mayonnaise
- 2 teaspoons Dijon mustard or regular
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 4 hard-cooked eggs, chopped
- 1 ½ Cups finely chopped celery
- 8 green onions sliced

Place sweet potatoes in a large saucepan and cover with water. Cover and boil gently until the potatoes can easily be pierced with the tip of a sharp knife, about 30-45 min. Drain. When potatoes are cool, peel and dice. In a large bowl, combine mayonnaise, mustard and salt. Stir in eggs, celery and onions. Add potatoes. Stir gently to mix. Cover and refrigerate for 2-4 hours. Yield: 8-10 servings.

#### **PIG PICKIN' CAKE**

Wonderful cake. Easy to make. Three layers topped with cool whip and pineapple.

- 1 (18.5 oz Pkg) Yellow cake mix
- 1 (11 oz) can mandarin oranges, including Juice
- 4 eggs
- 1/4 cup vegetable oil
- 3 (8 oz Pkg) frozen whipped topping, thawed
- 1 (15 oz) can crushed pineapple, drained
- 1 (3.5 oz Pkg) instant vanilla pudding mix

Mix together cake mix, canned oranges w/juice, eggs and oil. Pour batter into three greased and floured 8 inch round pans. Layers will be thin.

Bake at 350 degrees for 25 minutes, or until cake tests done. Cool layers on wire racks.

Mix together whipped topping, drained pineapple and instant pudding mix. Fill and frost the cooled cake. Refrigerate until ready to eat.

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
