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## Who's Who In The Guild

Irene was born in Cascade, New Hampshire, but grew up in Danbury, Connecticut with 3 sisters and one brother. Her mother taught her to sew when she was in the 4<sup>th</sup> grade and as a result she made her own clothes up through High School.

At the age of 17 she married the "love of her life" her husband Sal, while he was in the Navy in 1945. She had 6 children – 4 daughters and 2 sons. Irene made all the clothing for her 4 daughters including hats, coats and dresses.

She learned millinery from a neighbor in the business at an early age, working after school and weekends. When her neighbor moved to Florida many years later, Irene took over her business. Danbury was known as the "Hat City" of the world because hats were the prime industry.

In 1975 Irene opened a craft store called "Craft Basket" in Brookfield, Connecticut. She sold the business and moved to Hollywood, Florida in 1980.

Her life in Florida is where her quilting began. She made her first quilt in Hollywood, Florida called "Trip Around The World."

In 1995 Irene moved to Brooksville and later met Carol McCarthy, a nurse and member of our Guild, after her husband's surgery in 1998. That's when she really got hooked on quilting and has been a very active member since joining in 1998.

She is presently Charity Quilt Chairman, Home front Quilts Chairman and our current Treasurer.

We are indeed fortunate to have Irene as a member and a fellow quilter!



Gene was born in Trenton, New Jersey and grew up on a farm with all kinds of animals to take care of. She is the oldest of four children. Having 3 brothers contributed to her early tomboy years. Most of her young life and after she was married she had a horse.

Gene married at age 17 and will be married 58 years in December to George, a model quilter's husband. When they travel, George spends hours reading books and waiting in the car while Gene visits quilt shops around the country. Do they give out "Quilt Pins" to men like that! What a guy!

George and Gene have 3 children. One is a nurse and lives in Ft. Lauderdale. She had one daughter. Gene's other daughter lives in New Jersey and has 3 children, all grown up now. Gene's son lives in Arlington, Texas. He has one son still in high school.



# QUILTER'S CORNER

#### New Life For An Old Gift

Erma Bombeck, upon learning she had cancer, penned the words to "If I Had My Life To Live Over". The words share regret after regret of things not said, done, or lived. Looking through new eyes, she would have changed some of her past if she could.

Having no idea if she was a quilter, I can't help but think if she was, a line about quilts would have found it's way into her writing. Possibly something like, "I would have taken my quilt from the darkness of the cedar chest and brought it into the light of day. I would have feasted my eyes on the colors. I would have lovingly touched the textures of the fabrics. I would have pondered the thoughts and prayers that no doubt went into it".

What prompts these "musings"? A little over a year ago, I opened a box that had been opened only once in thirty years – during my family's move five years ago. It had been opened in order to be labeled for the move. It sat on a new shelf for another four years – unopened. It contained a set of tea towels embroidered by my Grandmother Sievers and my Aunt "Bece" (Bernice). Stumbling onto the box was a contradiction of emotions for me. I was thrilled to see their handwork again; to think about the loving hours they spent in giving me a perfect wedding gift. Yet, I was saddened by the feeling of bittersweet contradiction. Although made to be used, I didn't want them stained, worn, dulled, torn, i.e. used up.

Thirty years ago, I knew very little about quilting. Five years ago I was still fairly new in my business of long arm machine quilting. However, about a year ago, my mindset more clearly mirrored that of a friend of mine whose husband once said of her. "If anything stands still in front of her long enough, she quilts it!" Hence, the idea came naturally to quilt the tea towels and solve my dilemma. As some of my Grandmother's last handwork, why did they have to dry dishes? Why couldn't I display and enjoy them?

I cut each embroidered day-of-the-week word and bird (with its respective branch and/or leaf background) into quilt blocks. I sashed, bordered and pieced a wall quilt to hang in my kitchen. As a freehand long arm machine quilter, I added background designs to enhance the setting of each bird.

Gratification now replaces my feeling of bittersweet contradiction. Most importantly, the wall quilt honors my Grandmother's and Aunt's intentions of their gift, also solving my dilemma. The tea towels are being used, yet preserved; no regrets. I think Grandma, Aunt Bece....and Erma...would be pleased.
